School District Communicable Disease Management Plan OAR 581-022-2220	Molalla River Academy adheres to our adopted <u>Communicable Disease Plan</u> which is aligned with OAR 581-022-2220 and all required regulations within the <u>Communicable Disease Guidelines</u> for Oregon. Training on school-level practices designed specifically to prevent the spread of communicable disease is conducted regularly and aligned with job type. District nursing staff provide technical support at all schools, either remotely or in person, at all times during school operation.

We are in partnership with our local health authorities whenever there is a known case to enforce health department isolation periods. We recognize that each student is unique and brings special gifts and needs to our school. We focus on educating the whole child, paying particular attention to the social, emotional and academic well-being of our students.
COVID-19 and which students and families may need differentiated or additional support.	All students are greeted by their teacher at the start of each day. Students begin their day with a soft start and morning meeting in their classroom. This allows time for students to quietly reflect, journal, draw, talk with peers and or their teacher or classroom assistant. It also allows time for teachers to check in with individual students and the class as a whole. As a small school, we are fortunate to know our students very well and therefore quickly notice when a student is having a hard day. Our student support specialist is available to meet individually with a student or with small groups of students throughout each day.

Should any significant disproportionality in positive rates be evident, this school will utilize district resources to provide information and resources. Mental health services may be provided by Trillium Family Services (District partner) and support accessing general healthcare may be provided by referral through Clackamas County Public Health.
